The “Cross-Border IT and ITES Outsourcing” course introduces companies to the internationalization of information technology (IT) and IT-enabled services (ITES). This 2-week long course provides basic concepts, terminology and practical information on exporting IT-related services.

- Understand the topics to consider and the actions to take in order to prepare for exporting IT, IT services and IT-enabled services.

The demand for IT and ITES

Although cost savings have always been the dominant demand driver in offshore sourcing (for example, during the 2008 economic recession), shortages of skilled IT staff can also cause companies to go looking for talent abroad. A well-known example of a tight IT labour market occurred in the late 1990s due to the technology boom, the Y2K remediation efforts and the Euro currency conversion.
